




Learning Disabilities Mortality Review (LeDeR) Programme Annual Report 2020/21

Easy read – short summary Background




NHS Leeds CCG has written the second LeDeR annual report.



LeDeR is about stopping people with a learning disability from dying earlier than they should.



The LeDeR report tells us that there were problems with some people's care.



The annual report is about deaths in Leeds that have been reported during 2020/21.

These are the deaths of people over 4 years old.



What we learnt

Within the Leeds district 54 deaths were notified to the programme in 2020/21.

Most cases were men (56%).



For people with a learning disability the average age of death was 59.4 years old




Women with a learning disability died on average at 58 years old.



Men with a learning disability died on average at 61 years old.




79.6% of adults with learning disabilities whose deaths were reviewed were white.




There was an increase in in deaths during Spring and Summer 2020.




From the 54 individuals, 35 died in hospital.



The most common confirmed causes of death for people with a learning disability were Pneumonia and Coronavirus (Covid-19).



Coronavirus is a new disease that can affect your lungs, breathing and other parts of your body.



Pneumonia is when you have an infection in your lungs



7 out of 10 completed reviews concluded that people received satisfactory, good or excellent care.



All reviews showed people's health and wellbeing had been affected by the coronavirus pandemic.
